Arriving at Whitecross Court at midnight, he completed the circuit around the hospitals of the York & Scarborough NHS Trust, 251 KM and 7861 calories later.

All funds raised will go towards scalp cooling equipment to help to prevent hair loss during chemotherapy treatment.

More Projects funded

Safer Biopsy

An allocation of £45,704 has been approved to fund a Specto Ultrasound System.

The Urology cancer service receives around 2300 referrals a year with a around 650 patients requiring a prostate biopsy, resulting in an estimated 564 patients being diagnosed with prostate cancer.

Prostate biopsies to confirm the diagnosis of cancer are performed utilising Transrectal Ultrasound-Guided (TRUS) biopsy under a general anaesthetic.



This equipment facilitates a new procedure, Trans-perineal biopsy, which results in a significantly lower risk of infection and offers a better patient experience. Carried out under Local Anaesthetic it removes the risks associated with General Anaesthetic and also increases the volume of procedures which can be carried out.



Scalp Cooling System

We have funded £17,730 to pay for one Scalp Cooling System for York Hospital.

On average approximately 50 patients per month opt for scalp cooling at the York & Scarborough NHS Trust. It is expected that demand will increase as more people survive longer with more treatment opportunities available to them.

Scalp cooling is intended to help prevent hair loss, also known as chemotherapy-induced alopecia, in people undergoing SACT (Systemic Anti-Cancer Treatment).

It works by limiting blood flow to the scalp. Cooling the scalp in known to reduce the amount of the SACT that reaches the hair follicles, protecting them from the cytotoxic drugs which cause the alopecia. The service is offered to both male and female patients for a variety of SACT regimens known to induce alopecia.

Neurophysiology

A grant of £135 has been given for toys to distract young children whilst having EEGs.

An EEG involves sticking 25 small electrodes to the scalp, recording brain wave which the child is still, getting the child to hyperventilate (to show absence of epilepsy) and show a strobe light. Some children go home with a small recorder attached for 24 hours.



Around 300 children have the procedure each year with a good proportion being aged 1-4. The range of toys help to distract the children, keeping them still and content whilst having the tests.



Podiatry Shock Wave Therapy Unit

A Podiatry Shockwave Therapy Unit has been funded at a cost of £13,188.

The unit will provide treatment for patients who present with two of the most common foot conditions. (plantar fasciitis which is a painful debilitating heel condition and Achilles tendon pathology).

The equipment will also be made available to the physiotherapy service at York in joint clinics which will maximise the use of the machine and widen the scope of practice to benefit hospital and community patients using both the podiatry and physiotherapy services.

6th Form Shadowing Project

We have continued to support the 6th Form Shadowing Project with £2,000 for the 2023 cohort. There are 15 students this year who have been able to experience face-to-face sessions with consultant medical staff, allied health professionals and patients to see how the multidisciplinary team works. Other areas covered included applications to medical school, research, medical ethics and management challenges beyond Covid.

Archie said:

"The programme has given us insight into the medical profession and the work of all the NHS staff, along with the experiences of the patients who are cared for. Each person involved has reinforced my enthusiasm to apply for medical school later this year and begin the long journey to becoming a doctor."

Mellissa said:

"My work shadowing experience at the hospital has had all the variety and depth I had hoped for! The range of health professionals, patients and wider members of the NHS community we have met has been a real inspiration and a fantastic opportunity for me and my peers, especially considering the difficulty in finding medicine work experience opportunities after the Covid pandemic. The organisation of the programme has been superb and the range of additional extras, such as emails offering reading lists and the possibility of mentoring is highly valuable. It is also very thoughtful of the Friends of York Hospital to provide lunches to allow the programme to be more accessible for us.
